# One Nation One Subscription Scheme (ONOS)

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## Introduction

One Nation, One Subscription (ONOS), an initiative proposed by the Government of India (GoI), aims to provide countrywide access to national and international scientific and academic content. ONOS is expected to sign national licenses with most of the prominent STEM publishers and database producers across the world in order to encourage easy access to high-quality academic information, thus stimulating scientific research and innovation in the country. This initiative is expected to benefit research and educational institutions including universities, colleges, research organisations, as well as every citizen of the country through Libraries.

•Researchers and students need access to high quality publications

• Concept: Pooling of resources so that all students get access to a large number of publications.

#### **Key features**

#### **Extensive** Access

ONOS will provide access to nearly 13,000 e-journals from 30 major international publishers, ensuring a wide range of academic resources for users.

#### **Target Institutions**

The scheme will benefit over 6,300 higher education institutions and central government research and development institutions, covering both state-run entities.

## **Digital Platform**

The initiative will operate through a fully digital and user-friendly process, making it easier for institutions to access the resources.

### **Central Coordination**

The subscription will be coordinated by the Information and Library Network (INFLIBNET), an autonomous body under the University Grants Commission (UGC), which will handle payments to publishers on behalf of the institutions.

### **Budget** Allocation

A Total budget of ₹6,000 crore has been allocated for the year 2025, 2026, and 2027, underscoring the government's commitment to enhancing educational resources.

## **Awareness Campaigns**

The government plans to conduct information campaigns to promote awareness and usage of the ONOS scheme among students, faculty, and researchers.

#### Unified Access Model

This scheme aims to replace fragmented subscription models with a national subscription model, allowing institutions that previously could not afford comprehensive access to quality journals to benefit from equitable resources.

#### **Launch Date**

The ONOS scheme is set to launch on January 1, 2025, making a significant step in improving academic access in India.
